New Type of Program

We are trying a new type of program for our March meeting. Dr. Divoky will be joining us via the internet. We will be able to see his presentation and interact with him, asking questions and making comments. This opens some great possibilities for guest speakers.

March Program – Black Guillemots and Climate Change

As our winter wanes and turns to spring and we expect new arrivals who are heading north, we are also heading north – to Alaska - for a program about Black Guillemots, which breed in Alaska and often over winter in the same area or nearby. But this is more than a program about birds that live in the Arctic. It is also about the impact of climate change on these birds, their environment, and their neighbors.

Dr. Divoky has been going to Cooper Island near Point Barrow each summer to study the Black Guillemots and has discovered changes in their feeding options that relate to shrinking ice and some invasive species. He is usually out there solo and will share some of his adventures. Dr. Divoky has been the subject of a major NY Times Magazine article, has been the inspiration for a character in a play that ran in London last year, and has appeared on commercial and public radio and television.

Areas on the edge, such as the Arctic, are often prone to the earliest and greatest impact from change, and that is what Dr. Divoky is seeing on Cooper Island. The Guillemots may be canaries in the coal mine of climate change.

This program is a wonderful opportunity to hear and interact with a world renowned scientific researcher. It should be an exciting evening.

The Patuxent Bird Quiz

March - April Outdoors

- First day of Spring/Vernal Equinox March 21
- Full moon March 27
- · Great Horned Owl young hatch
- · Eastern Meadowlarks arrive
- Woodcocks return and start peenting
- Hooded Mergansers and Wood Ducks arrive (though we have had one of the latter in Medford all winter)
- Eastern Phoebes, Tree Swallows, and Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers arrive
- Bald Eagles start nesting
- Ruffed Grouse begin drumming

Flight Behavior by Barbara Kingsolver

I rarely include books here that I haven't read, but Kingsolver is one of my favorite authors. I usually find myself torn between savoring each page of her books and wanting to immediately read the whole book.

Although it involves flight and migration, this book is not about birds; it is about monarch butterflies. Or more accurately, about the interplay of conservation, climate change, and politics. Kingsolver's love for the natural world and her understanding of the complexities of societal and individual needs usually show in her writing, and I expect the same in this book.
